

A Band Reunion- Monte Stanco

The Newcastle High school band, under the leadership of Moth Jan Kooyman, always supported the Moths in all their parades. This band won the South Africa championships in 1995 and the band members decided to hold a 30 year reunion on the 4th October 2025 at the Monte Stanco Shellhole in Newcastle. Trumpeter Dave Coleman (who has served in the British Army for the past 24 years and is now a Captain) and Paul Gillott (now living in Germany) started planning the reunion at the beginning of 2025 and were able to contact 14 old members to invite them to attend. Some of them travelled from the Cape and one even flew in from Mauritius.

A few musical instruments were borrowed from the High School, and to the surprise of all, some of the band members were still able to play a few tunes which they had last played 30 years ago. Dave Coleman often assisted the Monte Stanco Moths by sounding the Last Post and Revellie at Moth funerals. In the second photo, we have Moth Jan

Dundee-born war hero commemorated for being last man to walk out of Delville Wood

A former Dundee High School pupil, Captain Garnet George Green, holds the rare distinction of being the last man to leave the trenches at Delville Wood during one of World War I's most harrowing battles.

His bravery and that of thousands of other South African troops were remembered at the Endumeni Isandlwana Moth Shellhole, where a parade was held and a wreath laid in memory of those who made the ultimate sacrifice.

Painstaking research by the late Pat Rundgren shed light on the remarkable life and sacrifice of Captain Green, who was born in Dundee in 1889.

A proud product of Dundee High School, which lost 20 old boys and three staff members in the Great War, Green's military journey began with the Natal Carbineers. He fought in the Bambatha Rebellion of 1906, the South West Africa campaign in 1914-15, and later in Egypt against the Senussi forces.

As a second lieutenant in 'C' Company of the 3rd South African Infantry, Green endured the nightmare that was Delville Wood.

Ordered to hold the line at all costs, South African troops entered the wood on July 15, 1916. When relief arrived five days later, only 18 officers and 702 men remained of the 3155 who had gone in.

On July 20, Green was the last man to emerge from the trench.

Brigadier-General Tanner recommended him for the Distinguished Service Order. Promoted to captain in January 1918, Green continued to lead from the front.

Tragically, he was killed in action on March 22, 1918, at Gauche Wood while resisting a German advance.

Eyewitnesses described his leadership as 'unobtrusive and unpretentious', and noted that 'he was universally popular'.

The Moths used the opportunity to unveil the new braai area adorned in military-style camouflage paint.

A plaque was unveiled in a salute to those who served in the Border War (1966-1989) and whose contribution is often overlooked. The Moth Shellhole is open to visitors every Friday evening from 17:30

A story of yesteryear.....






Sharing a story of yesteryear, before the memory fades and its lost to history.

This is a first-hand account of what I as a young lad remember from the mid 60's.

Back ground: My paternal grandfather stayed in the Woodstock area of Cape Town, while my grandmother (mothers' side) lived very near the Ysterplaat Airbase on the corner of Ysterplaat and Fairbairn Street, not very far from my parents who also lived in the suburb of Brooklyn.

My grandfather spent the last years of the war as a Prisoner of War (#9396) and was released on the 17 May 1945, hence his association with the M.O.T.H



From what I can remember, both my father and grandfather used to frequent MOTH meetings in the Maitland Town Hall. I guess there used to be lots of harmony, fun and TC.

I distinctly remember this label, being the cause of my mother's "vocal disgusts", after one of my father's returns from a MOTH meeting.

Tommy Rendle VC Shellhole, received their charter on 20 October 1946 and in the early years, MOTH meetings took place in the Maitland Town Hall, Maitland Hotel or somewhere in the Brooklyn area.

Story two, also set in the mid 60's.

I used to travel to school which was in Maitland, on one of the City Tramways busses, those green & cream, double decker ones, with the entry / exit an "open landing" at back.

One morning on the bus, there was hushed stories about all the "ducktails", wearing hats, caps and beanies.

I was aware of, the "ducktails" but perhaps too innocent to have paid more attention.

By eavesdropping on my parents and their friends' conversations, I later learnt that, a group of airbase guys (Ysterplaat) had cornered a number of the "ducktails" and had cut off their "ducktails".

In turn, the "ducktails" felt humiliated and refused to go to work.






The evening started with a delicious three-course meal which was catered for by Bidvest Catering, and followed by our famous Tombola draw, with over 100 tombola prizes to be won.



At the end of the evening, all the table décor was sold off and funds were donated to our feeding fund – Guardian Angels -which is managed by Twilight Red Tab.
